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# The 2017 Operating Millage (Renewal) Informational





## What is our YCS Operating Millage?

Since 1994, the State has controlled school funding

- YCS is requesting a Millage Proposal be put before voters
- It is only proposed for Washtenaw County-Ypsilanti Community Schools
- It passes or fails on a local basis, not by all of Washtenaw
   County residents
- Ypsilanti Community Schools has local control over how the money is spent for operating purposes

### What is the Specific Proposal?

- May 2nd Ballot
- 18 mills to be levied over 5 years
- .5 mills for 5 years to restore
   Headlee reduction\*
- Approximately \$8,901,558 annually
- If the Millage does not pass YCS will lose \$2,370.29 per pupil

- Operating Millage would <u>NOT</u> cost principal homeowners any increase in taxes
- Money would go to Ypsilanti
   Community Schools starting in
   2018 thru 2022
- City of Ypsilanti, Ypsilanti
   Township and Superior
   Township

**Note:** .5 mill is only available to be levied to restore millage lost as a result of a reduction required by the "Headlee" amendment to the Michigan Constitution of 1963, and will only be levied to the extent necessary to restore that reduction.

## May 2nd

Citizens living within the boundaries of The Ypsilanti Community School District will be asked to vote on a proposal to renew and restore the non-homestead Operating Millage on the following properties:

- Apartment Buildings
- Rental Homes
- Vacation Properties
- Vacant Land
- Commercial and Industrial Properties

100% principal residential dwellings will <u>NOT</u> be financially affected

#### How much will this cost a local homeowner?

If the Millage passes, there will be **NO** increase of cost to homeowners. Non-homestead represents industrial, commercial, business, rental and certain agricultural properties and second homes

100% Principal Residence Exemption = Homeowners 0% Increase

# Why Ypsilanti Community Schools requested to put this Proposal before Voters?

- Ypsilanti Community Schools is committed to providing the quality education needed for its students to be successful and believes this investment will help them do so
- Despite reducing or freezing salaries, benefits, administrative costs and implementing other cost saving measures, districts are struggling to provide core educational programs
- A recent statewide school funding adequacy study supports the need for added investment into local schools to prepare students for success after school
- Ypsilanti Community Schools system wants to increase educational opportunities for all Ypsilanti Community Schools students

## How will the money be used?

As an aggregate, we will....

- Hire and retain quality teachers and administrative staff
- Support students with added needs
- Improve School programs
- Improve district technology and computer upgrades
- Maintain building repairs

## ...and specifically?

- Improve and maintain curricular programs and services for all students
- Support our reading and mathematics programming
- Support the School Improvement Plans
- Upgrade and improve facilities
- Modernize classroom furniture and equipment in buildings
- Preventative maintenance of school buildings
- Make payroll
