SECTION 3IA - AT-RISK

Section 31a of the State School Aid Act provides funding to eligible districts for focus on the following student outcomes: attending school regularly, reading proficiently by the end of 3rd grade, being proficient in mathematics by the end of 8th grade, and being career and college ready by high school graduation.

Funds afforded through Section 31a At-risk are limited to instructional services and direct non-instructional services to pupils. They may not be used for administration or other related costs. An "at-risk pupil" is a pupil that means any of the listed criteria as identified in Section 31a.

- Economically disadvantaged
- English learner
- Chronically absent as defined and reported to CEPI
- Victims of child abuse or neglect
- Pregnant teenager or teenage parent
- Family history of school failure, incarceration, or substance abuse
- Immigrant
- Did not complete high school in four years and is still in school
- Did not achieve proficiency in ELA, mathematics, science, or social studies state summative assessment
- At-risk of not meeting the LEA's core academic curricular objectives in ELA or mathematics based on local assessments

BUS TRACKING APP

Do you have a scholar who rides the school bus? Do you want to be able to keep track of the bus? We encourage you to download the Versatrans MyStop App. The Versatrans MyStop is an app that is available on any iOS (Apple) or Android (Google) smartphone. CIRCLE OF EXCELLENCE

Meet Jerilyn Lynn. She is the Ypsilanti Community Schools Technology Resource Specialist.

How long have you worked for the district? I have worked for the district for 36 years. I have worked for eight superintendents.

What brought you to YCS?

I finished my degree at CMU, and to become certified I needed three years of teaching experience. The district where I lived and worked as a library clerk did not have the funds to hire me as a media specialist, so I began applying for positions in other areas. I found the position in Ypsilanti and submitted a resume, but not an application. At the time, I was not sure if I wanted to be so far away from home. Ypsi is three hours away from where I grew up. After my interview, the Principal followed me to my car and asked if she could take me to dinner. The principal told me I was the only one who smiled during the interview, so she was interested in learning more about me. After the dinner, the principal asked me to apply in the next few days.

Was the decision to accept the offer an easy one?

I had to talk about it with my family. We decided it would be a good thing to do for the year, so I drove three hours to drop off the application, and two days later I received a job offer. I began as a Media Specialist.

How quickly did things progress after you accepted?

I accepted the position a few days before school began. My family managed to pull everything together in just three days, and I moved to the area and lived with a family member. I commuted home every weekend. Each Monday morning I would drive to Ypsilanti, then I returned home each Friday after school, during my first year working for YPS. I rented an apartment in year two, and my son eventually moved here to attend Eastern Michigan University.

Why YCS? What would you tell someone looking for a position in the District?

After the three years were up, I decided to remain in Ypsilanti, because I liked the kids and enjoyed my work. I liked the Superintendent and the principal I worked for. To me, this has always been a good place. If you're looking for support, and assistance this is the place to be.

Thirty-six years is a long time. How many buildings have you worked in?

I moved around to several schools. The first move was with the principal that hired me. She worked at Chapelle and she took me with her as we moved to Fletcher. When Fletcher closed due to low enrollment in the district, my next building was Adams Elementary which is currently YIES.

So, you were working for YPS during the merger. Can you share that experience?

Demographics changed. I noticed families moving out of Ypsilanti once factories began closing. When I started working in Ypsilanti Public Schools there were six elementary schools, two middle schools, and one high school.

Discussions about merging began in 2012. There were lots of schools of choice students leaving Willow Run to attend YPS and vice versa, so the WISD collaborated to join the two districts.

Have you ever considered leaving the district?

No, I have never applied to work anyplace else, even though I was offered a position at my former place of employment which is closer to my family.

What would you say to a person new to the district?

There are a lot of things that you can not put a dollar amount on. Materials are important. PD for staff inside and outside of the district is important. There is a lot of support here.

What makes us great?

The atmosphere created in the schools where kids feel welcome is what the district does well. Caring adults make kids feel like they have support.

What do you consider an opportunity for us to improve?

Telling our story, because it is a good place to be, but people do not know. We have a good staff.

What is the key to your joy at work?

Ypsilanti Community Schools (Ypsilanti Public Schools) is where I found something that I didn't know I needed.

What do you want people to say about you?

I am easygoing, always willing to help, and committed.

A little-known fact about Jerilyn Lynn.

Forbidden Fruit Love: Stories of the Underground Railroad by Detroiter Betty DeRamus has a chapter dedicated to Mrs. Lynn's ancestors. "Hound Dogs Hate Red Pepper" details the story of Isaac Berry's travels as he escaped enslavement and traveled to Michigan in search of his love, Lucy Millard. The two married in Canada and later moved to Mecosta County, Michigan. The author uses anecdotes from descendants, census records, and old articles to weave a story about a young man's pursuit of love in a time of severely limited opportunities.

To describe the journey, DeRamus wrote "and they remember Isaac and Lucy Berry, one black, one white, one walking, one riding, and their search for a green hideaway, their own personal Palmyra, where love could glow and grow under the free skies."













