


















BEATTY VISITS EASTERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY

The building tours allowed the school administration and student leaders to highlight recent accomplishments, programs, or initiatives.










A LOOK INSIDE FORD EARLY LEARNING CENTER

PERRY POINTS OF PRIDE PRESENTED TO THE YPSILANTI COMMUNITY SCHOOLS BOARD OF EDUCATION

- Perry students attended three virtual performances through the University Musical Society at U of M and an in-person event on 3/13/2023.
- Kindergarten and first-grade boys attend "Gentleman's Lunch" twice per month with Mr. Easley and other positive male role models from the community.
- In the fall of 2022, first-grade students from Perry met weekly for Grizzly Jr. Robotics. This year's theme was SUPERPOWERED and the students learned where energy comes from and how it is used; they knew the impact of our energy choices and then brainstormed ideas to create a better "energy journey" for our community. On December 3, two robotics teams from Perry, led by Ms. Miller and Mr. Bennett, participated in the FIRST LEGO League Explore Gigawatt Festival. The teams presented their models and posters to reviewers and received an award.
- Perry students participated in Global Play Day on February 1, 2023.
- Perry has one of the largest student populations in the district, with 379 students, and one of the highest retention rates with staff total experience, a combined 478 years serving the YCS community.
- Perry has several educator-led groups, such as:
 - Gardening Club
 - Reflection Network
 - Literacy Study Group
 - Staff Appreciation and Events
 - PBIS
 - PTAB (Parent Teacher Advisory Board)
- Perry is the proud home of Grizzly Learning Camp and Extended School Year.
- This year at Perry, 172 projects have been funded through Donors Choose, totaling \$100,000 in supplies and assisting 41 teachers and students.

ATTENTION HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS INTERESTED IN HEALTHCARE FIELDS

The Certified Nurse Assistant (C.N.A.) program is enrolling students for the fall. Students will experience work in many healthcare career paths like nursing, dental assistant, radiography, surgical technology, physical therapy technician, and hospital administration.

C.N.A.s are responsible for helping patients with daily living activities, assisting with personal hygiene, and maintaining a safe, clean environment. In this program, students receive hands-on training in basic nursing tasks such as taking vital signs, moving patients, and providing personal care. In the last portion of the course, students work in a Long-Term Care Facility, and students care for residents.

Students who enroll in this program have the opportunity to earn nine college credits and can take the state C.N.A. exam. The C.N.A. certification also meets one of the admission requirements for the W.C.C. Nursing Program and many other health programs. Upon completing the program, students will have earned a C.P.R. and a C.N.A. certificate!


