



Annual Scholarships


- Each year, the Ypsilanti Rotary Club awards competitive scholarships to area students who plan to pursue a college degree.

 Community Schools or Lincoln Consolidated but may attend public school, private school, be homeschooled, or a "school of choice.






Gene Butman Memorial Scholarship

- Applicants will also be evaluated for their potential for leadership, exemplified by leadership roles In high school and in their community




Dr. Gunder A. Myran Washtenaw Community College Scholarship



- This scholarship will be awarded to a student who will be attending Washtenaw Community College taking at least 8 credit hour.
- Applicants must have maintained a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale
- At the discretion of the committee, the scholarship will be split between two semesters
- Financial need may be a consideration in making this award.



Eastern Michigan University Rotary Memorial Scholarship

- This scholarship will be awarded to a student who will be attending Eastern Michigan University taking at least 12 credit hours
- Applicants must have maintained a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale
- Financial need is not a consideration in making this award






The Anhut Family Scholarship

- Applicants will also be evaluated for their potential for leadership, exemplified by leadership roles in high school and in their community




- Bob Willoughby was a long-time Ypsilanti

- Applicants will also be evaluated for their potential for leadership, exemplified by their roles in high school and their community










National Pan-Hellenic Council



- On May 10, 1930, on the campus of Howard University, in Washington DC, the National Pan-Hellenic Council was formed as a permanent organization with the following charter members: Omega Psi Phi and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternities, and Alpha Kappa Alpha, Delta Sigma Theta and Zeta Phi Beta Sororities. In 1931, Alpha Phi Alpha and Phi Beta
 Sigma Fraternities joined the Council. Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority joined in 1937 and Iota Phi Theta Fraternity completed the list of member organizations in 1997.
- The stated purpose and mission of the organization in 1930 was "Unanimity of thought and action as far as possible in the conduct of Greek letter collegiate fraternities and sororities, and to consider problems of mutual interest to its member organizations."



The charting organizations included: Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. - Theta Zeta Lambda Chapter, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.-Delta Psi Omega Chapter, Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. - Ann Arbor/Ypsilanti/Inkster Chapter, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. - Ann Arbor Alumnae Chapter, and Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc. - Rho Delta Zeta Chapter. Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. - Sigma Rho Chapter joined the NPHCAA in 2012. Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc. - Zeta Zeta Sigma Chapter joined in 2022.



SCHOLARSHIP



Southeast Michigan Omega Foundation (SMOFI)

- Since 2001, we have awarded college scholarships to 82 graduating high school students, amounting to over \$300,000. Our scholars have maintained an impressive 88% graduation rate. In 2021, we anticipate awarding twenty-six (26) scholarships totaling \$30,000 (new and renewed awards).
- \$6000 Scholarship Award (\$1500 x 4 yrs.)
- This year's completed application package must be E-mailed by April 15, 2023
 - Application can be downloaded at www.smofi.org.
- Eligible applicants include African-American male seniors who attend a high school in Southeast Michigan (Washtenaw, Wayne, Oakland & Macomb counties);
 - Plan to attend an accredited 4-year College or University, beginning Fall Semester 2021.
 - Have a minimum cumulative G.P.A. of 2.75 on a 4.0 scale
 - Demonstrate good character and possess evidence of leadership abilities.
 - Qualified students with documented financial need will receive higher funding priority.

Sigma Rho 2023 Virtual Talent Hunt

- The Talent Hunt program of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. is one of several national programs designed to identify and support the youth of our nation and the world. The original idea was created by the 9th Grand Basileus, Brother J. Alston Atkins of Winston Salem, North Carolina, and Brother Dewey Duckett of Rock Hill, South Carolina. While the idea was conceived in 1945, the first District Talent Hunt program was held in the Sixth District in Charlotte, North Carolina, on April 19, 1946.
- Amount and number of cash awards are determined based on participation.
- 1st Place winner will represent Sigma Rho in 10th District Talent Hunt.
 Travel stipend, room and board for one night to include contestant and one adult.
- Contestant must be a high school student who has not advanced beyond a senior at the time of the local Talent Hunt competition.
- Contestants who are homeschooled must present verification from their school district that they are enrolled as a high school student.
- All presentations including instrumental numbers must be memorized, dignified, and in good taste. Presentations which are not memorized cannot be considered for prizes.
- Participation in the Talent Hunt is open for the following forms of performing and visual art:
 - Music: Vocal and instrumental; classical, semi-classical (i.e. Broadway Musical production, Movie score), gospel and jazz. A printed copy of the music (score) is required for the judges to analyze. No top 40 musical performances are allowed unless they meet the criteria listed for semi classical. No hip hop or rap performances are allowed.
 - 2. Dance: ballet, modern dance, and tap.
 - 3. Dramatic Interpretation: Poetry, oration, monologue, etc. (Printed script must be provided for each judge).
 - 4. Visual Art: Sculpture, photography, drawing and painting. (3 to 5 pieces for judging)








A BRIEF HERSTORY

Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Incorporated was founded on January 16, 1920, on the campus of Howard University in Washington, D.C. by five co-eds, Arizona Leedonia Cleaver, Pearl Anna Neal, Fannie Pettie, Viola Tyler, and Myrtle Tyler. These women dared to depart from the traditional coalitions for African-American women and sought to establish a new organization predicated on the precepts of SCHOLARSHIP, SERVICE, SISTERHOOD, and FINER WOMANHOOD. The trail blazed by the Founders has been traversed by thousands of women dedicated to the emulation of the objectives and ideals of the sorority.

- Over 600+ chapter located in the domestic U.S., West Africa, Germany, Bahamas Island, Dubai, Virgian Islands, Japan, South Korea, and Italy
- The 1st Greek Lettered organization to charter a chapter in Africa
- The 1st form adult and youth auxiliary groups: Amicae, Archonettes, Amicettes, and Pearlettes
- Constitutionally bound to a brother group, Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Incorporated



ON SEPTEMBER 19, 1963, AT MORGAN STATE COLLEGE (NOW MORGAN STATE UNIVERSITY), 12 STUDENTS FOUNDED THE IOTA PHI THETA FRATERNITY, INCORPORATED ®, AND ESTABLISHED THE FOLLOWING PURPOSE: "THE OVER 250 CHAPTERS LOCATED IN 40 STATES, THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA AND THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA. THE SCOPE OF THE ORGANIZATION EXTENDS THROUGHOUT THE NATION, FROM CALIFORNIA TO NEW YORK; FROM WYOMING TO FLORIDA; AND FROM WISCONSIN TO THE BAHAMAS ISLANDS.
